# The Powell Street Festival first took place in 1977 and has since expanded to be one of the largest and longest-running community arts festivals in Canada.

The Powell Street Festival Society (PSFS) now functions as a non-profit registered charity arts organization based in Vancouver and the Paueru Gai Area—today known as the Downtown Eastside—located on the unceded territories of the Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish), Səlílwəta\(^4\) (Tsleil-Waututh) and x\(^8\)məθkwəyəm (Musqueam) Nations.

In addition to the Powell Street Festival, the Society offers year-round programs and collaborates with local, national, and international organizations, artists, and communities to advance equity and well-being for all.

We aim to program events and activities that welcome a wide range of participants, striving towards more barrier free experiences. In 2022:

- All events and programs were free of charge, or sliding scale.
- ASL interpretation was incorporated into select live events (such as the *Road Work:* Street Photography from the 70s & 80s and a number of festival events).
- The Festival printed program and website were available in both English and Japanese. Festival emcees also hosted in both English and Japanese.
- Our festival livestream, *Festival Connect*, invited those unable to attend in-person to stay involved and enjoy select programming from home.

As PSFS continues to work to reduce barriers and grow community relationships, we welcome all feedback regarding the accessibility of our programming.

## 46TH ANNUAL POWELL STREET FESTIVAL

#### This year's Festival returned to Oppenheimer Park and the Paueru Gai neighborhood with deep appreciation for the power of relationships and community.

With your support, we celebrated with a full-build two-day festival after going online the past two years. Applying lessons from the pandemic, we also produced *Festival Connect*, our on-the-ground livestream for those unable to attend in-person. Committed to showcasing dynamic and diverse programming, Japanese Canadian and beyond, Powell Street Festival presented an exciting lineup of events and initiatives, including:

- Performances and presentations by local and international professional artists
- Festival-favourite performers (martial artists, folk singers, poets, musicians and dancers)
- Partnerships with organizations such as the New Media Gallery, Anvil Theatre and more,
- Fuki no Mizu, a bespoke water mister installation designed in collaboration with UBC's School of Architecture and Landscape Architecture
- A new Cup-Share program as part of our Zero Waste Challenge







# 46TH ANNUAL POWELL STREET FESTIVAL

As we adapt and recover from the pandemic, our festival survey demonstrates that we continue to offer outstanding cultural experiences that foster a community of diverse and committed festival goers.


How would you rate your experience at the festival?

When did you attend your first Powell Street Festival?




Our festival goers are diverse and self-identify as:




27% of festival goers primarily speak a language other than English

## YEAR-ROUND PROGRAMS

From May to August, we welcomed our first-ever Japanese Canadian Youth Cohort to the PSFS community. This program for three Japanese Canadian youth ages 19-29 aims to create an embodied experience of Japanese Canadian identity as vibrant and vital. Beginning with online training, education, intergenerational relationship building, and skills development, this program culminated in a 10-day production residency in Vancouver, where the Cohort traveled to sites of Japanese Canadian cultural interest and gained hands-on experience as members of the festival production team.

A new Cohort will join us in May 2023.





PSFS continued the stewardship of **360 Riot Walk**, an interactive walking tour of Vancouver's 1907 Anti-Asian Riots, created by artist Henry Tsang. It uses 360 video technology to trace the history and route of the riots in what is today known as the Downtown Eastside. This unique project interweaves the narratives of racialized communities, reclaiming how and what histories are told.

This year, the project expanded into education, piloting a field trip walking tour and a teacher resource for online tours.

The Paueru Mashup Community Dance is a high-energy dance that is accessible to all ages and abilities. It was commissioned from Onibana Taiko and Company 605 in 2020. Join us for lessons leading up to the Festival, or follow along with our Youtube tutorials to prepare yourself for the flash mob at the next Festival!



## YEAR-ROUND PROGRAMS


Thanks to donors and supporters, the success of the Telethon fundraising event in 2020 became a catalyst for unprecedented growth of our **Downtown (DTES) Community Care Programs**: it is our grassroots efforts to enhance the community's well-being in the face of ongoing food insecurity, housing crisis and other emergencies.

In 2022, we invested \$350,462 to support job creation, care packages, meal preparation and grocery delivery in the DTES.

- 63% of these funds created skills-building and low-barrier jobs for DTES residents.
- 30% were spent on groceries and supplies for the safe distribution of healthy meals.
- The remaining 7% covered peer salaries for the implementation of Powell Street Festival, events and our DTES Community Care Programs.

In November, we launched our **Winter Care Package Fundraiser** with a goal to raise \$10,000 to assemble and distribute 250 care packages to unhoused and precariously housed individuals living in the DTES. It is our third Care Package project since 2020.

With many thanks to individuals donors, we exceeded our goal and look forward to distributing 250+ winter care packages in the new year. Special thanks to Washington Market and DTES SRO Collaborative for their contributions.



Our DTES Community Care Programs collaborate with:

- WePress Community Kitchen, which prepares 700-1,000 meals per week for the unhoused and precariously housed in the DTES.
- DTES SRO Collaborative on the Chinatown Grocery Program and DTES Indigenous Elders Grocery Program, which altogether deliver groceries to 190 underserved elders and SRO tenants per week, thanks to **Bing Ho**'s family and friends.
- Community Impact Real Estate Society and EMBERS Eastside Works, whose grants support low-barrier employment for people living on low incomes and fulfill key roles in our distribution of meals and groceries.
- PSFS' **Advocacy and Outreach Committee**, a team of dedicated volunteers who participate in DTES community-building efforts and organize annual events (see next page).

### **E**VENTS

Our Advocacy and Outreach Committee (AOC) hosted numerous events, including Hanami (April 10), Asahi Tribute Game (Aug 20) and Minori Harvest (Nov 13), providing capacity-building paid work opportunities, food and resources for DTES residents, and cultural activities which share Japanese Canadian history and culture. Special thanks to WePress, Freybe, Yakashiro Farm & Gardens, Vancouver Japanese Language School, Lepp Farm Market, Oppenheimer Park and Carnegie Community Centre for their support. Kyōdai (Dec 3) at the Fox Cabaret was a multi-sensory concert experience created in collaboration with Nikkei National Museum and Cultural Centre. Exploring the theme of kyōdai (siblings) through Japanese Canadian home videos pre, during and post incarceration, the event featured musicians Jason de Couto Trio, Prince Shima, and Āza Nabuko, and home video curation by artist and video archivist Jeffery Chong.

In 2021, PSFS, in partnership with DKAM, became recipients of Canadian Heritage's **Support for Workers in Live Arts and Music Sectors Fund**. The grant supported the arts and cultural sectors during the pandemic by supporting live and digital arts and cultural experiences. This live event series concluded in 2022, and included the events below.


